It's fitting that Bryant headlines the Homecoming concert at LMU as his new album, Upbringing, is a homecoming for him.





Dedications





Lincoln Memorial University is dedicating the Tennis Complex in honor of Dr. Arthur D. "Art" Brill, '53, in honor of his many years of service to the LMU Board of Trustees. He was a distinguished tennis player and a member of the Alpha Lambda Zeta fraternity. After serving in the United States Army from 1953-1955, he completed a Master of Science in Education in 1956 and an EdD in 1968 at Indiana University Bloomington. In addition to his successful career in education, Art and Betty Ann Brill have been involved in real estate ventures together for many years. During a time of needed leadership at LMU due to the declining health of the president, Brill served as Provost and Chief Executive Officer.





Lincoln Memorial University is dedicating the LMU-College of Veterinary (LMU-CVM) in honor of Dr. Richard Gillespie, '55, for his many years of service to the LMU Board of Trustees. Gillespie earned his medical degree from the University of Tennessee College of Medicine, Memphis in 1959 and had a private practice in Knoxville from 1964 to 1981. In 1981 he opened Sullins Surgical Center offering outpatient care well before its time. He is a founding member of the board of directors of Alternacare Corporation of America, which later joined Hospital Corporation of America.





Abraham Lincoln Library and Museum Phase 2 Dedication (2 p.m. on Friday, Oct.7)

Lincoln Memorial University (LMU) will celebrate the Abraham Lincoln Library and Museum's Phase 2 expansion with the dedication of the newly renovated second floor. Phase 1 of the \$7 million renovation and expansion project was revealed during Homecoming 2021.

With funding from the Dorothy M. Kincaid \$1 Million Matching Campaign and the Carter Family, the second floor renovation includes the installation of two new permanent exhibits. The first is a Civil War exhibit featuring weapons, naval and artillery models, and



other artifacts. It features local pieces and naval pieces from the USS Monitor. The other new gallery entitled "Lincoln Remembered," examines the various ways Abraham Lincoln has been commemorated after his death. Of note is the ALLM's much loved Lincoln bed, items from Steven Spielberg's "Lincoln" movie, and items from the film "Abraham Lincoln: Vampire Hunter."

Additionally, the ALLM will debut a new 10-minute movie which introduces LMU's impressive collection and will play for museum guests in the Arnold Auditorium.

Homecoming Family Day at the Abraham Lincoln Library and Museum (9 a.m. – 5 p.m.)

The Abraham Lincoln Library and Museum will host a full day of family-friendly activities at the museum and the Pioneer Village. In addition to free admission to the ALLM, alumni and friends will have the opportunity to visit with Abraham Lincoln performer Dennis Boggs. Other activities include children's 19th century games, corn husk doll making and other craft opportunities.

Educators can visit and pick up free educational resources throughout the weekend. A special presentation will take place for teachers at 11 a.m. on Saturday, with information on how the ALLM can assist them with in-person museum trips, long distance connections and digital resources.

Free copies of the 125th anniversary children's book will also be available for pick up at the museum. The book can be used for a campus-wide scavenger hunt to "find" Abraham Lincoln. A prize package will be awarded to the child who finds the most Abes.

"Crisis of Cumberland"




The Mary
